Marginal Risk (Level 1 of 5)

Key Messages

- Scattered showers & storms this afternoon.
- Showers & storms becoming more widespread this evening/tonight ahead of a cold front.
- Risk for isolated severe storms (damaging winds & large hail) and localized flash flooding.



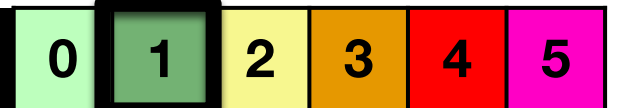

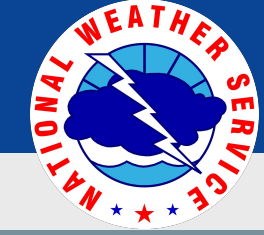
- Primary severe weather threat is damaging wind, with a secondary threat for large hail.

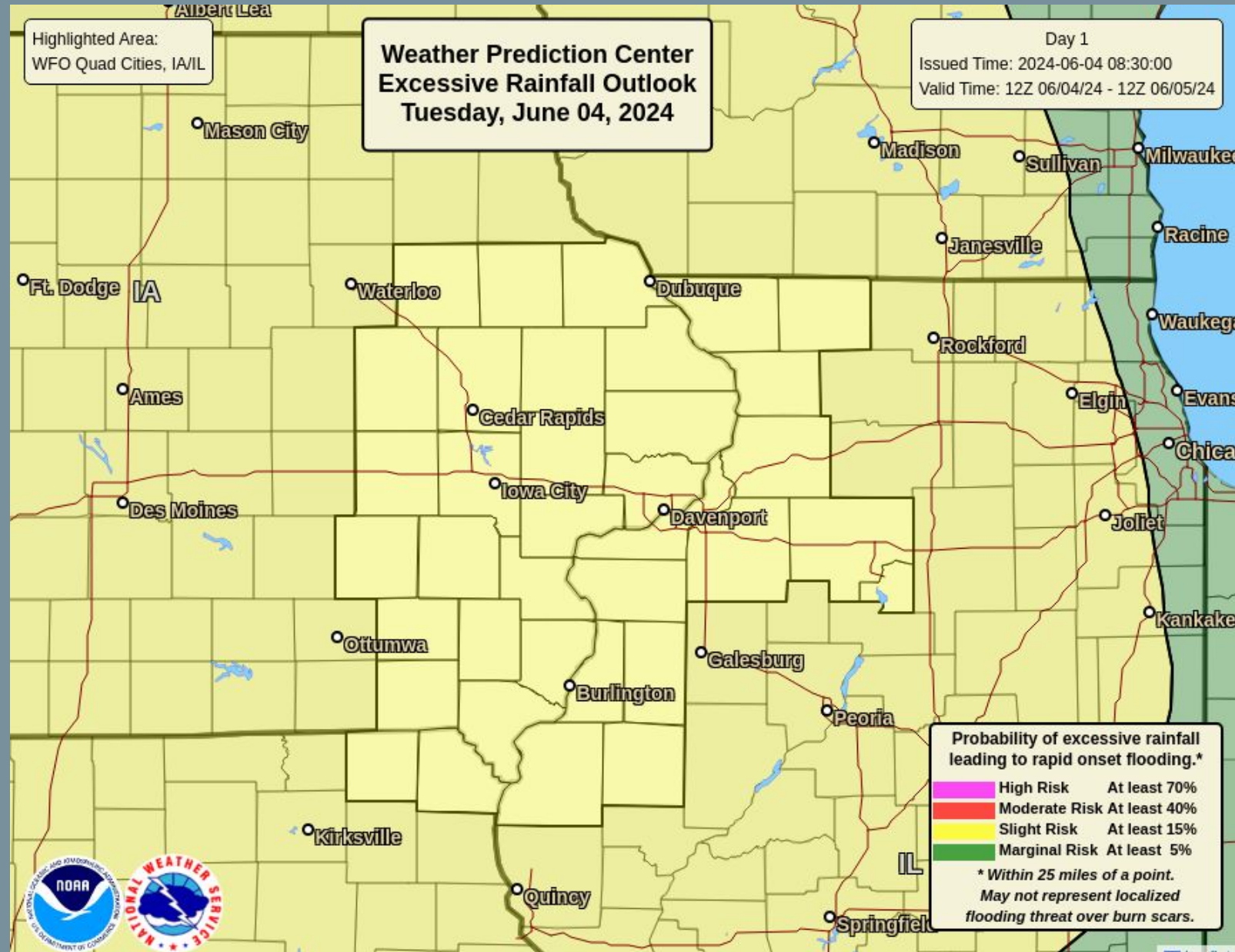

Locally Heavy Rain Could Lead to a Threat of Isolated Flash Flooding

Flash Flooding Risk

- Thunderstorms may produce locally heavy rain of 1-3+ inches posing a risk for isolated flash flooding.
- High rainfall rates could lead to flash flooding if occurring in urban and poor drainage areas.
- Locations in Delaware, Dubuque, Jo Daviess and Stephenson counties that received heavy rain on Monday will be more prone to flooding.



3 SIMPLE STEPS FOR FLASH FLOOD SAFETY

During a flood, water levels and the rate at which the water is flowing can quickly change. Remain aware and monitor local radio and television.

- 1 GET TO HIGHER GROUND**
Get out of the areas subject to Flooding
- 2 DO NOT DRIVE INTO WATER**
Do NOT drive or walk into flooded areas. It only takes 6" of water to knock you off your feet.
- 3 STAY INFORMED**
Monitor local radar, television, weather radio, internet or social media for updates.

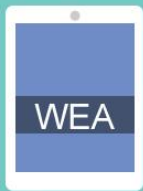
