Some Severe Storms and Flash Flooding Possible

Key Messages

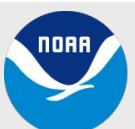
- Several rounds of storms expected through Friday night, some of the storms could become severe with damaging winds the primary threat.
- **Flash flooding** will also be possible, especially in areas where 2-4"+ rain has fallen in the past 24 hrs, with rain rates between **1 - 2"+ per hour**.
- The most widespread storm coverage is anticipated late Friday afternoon - Friday night.
 - A break in the rain 'may' occur mid-late morning

Flash Flooding Threat Through Friday Night

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Areas That Received 2-4" Rainfall Last Night Most Susceptible

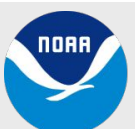
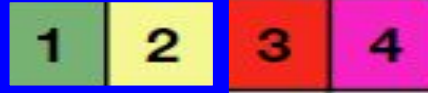
Details:

- Repeated rounds of storms today through early Saturday are forecast with rain totals between 1 - 3"+ in a short amount of time. **This may lead to flash flooding in poor drainage and low-lying locations (including urban areas), and cause rapid rises on creeks and streams.**
- **Rainfall rates of 1 - 2"+ per hour are possible** with the strongest storms this afternoon and tonight.
- The overall probability for flash flooding has **increased** across the area.
- Rises on area tributary rivers **are likely** with low confidence on sites reaching flood stage.

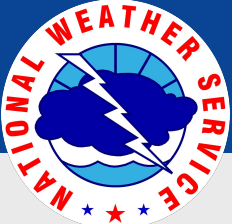
→ Heed local warnings and remember to **Turn Around, Don't Drown!**

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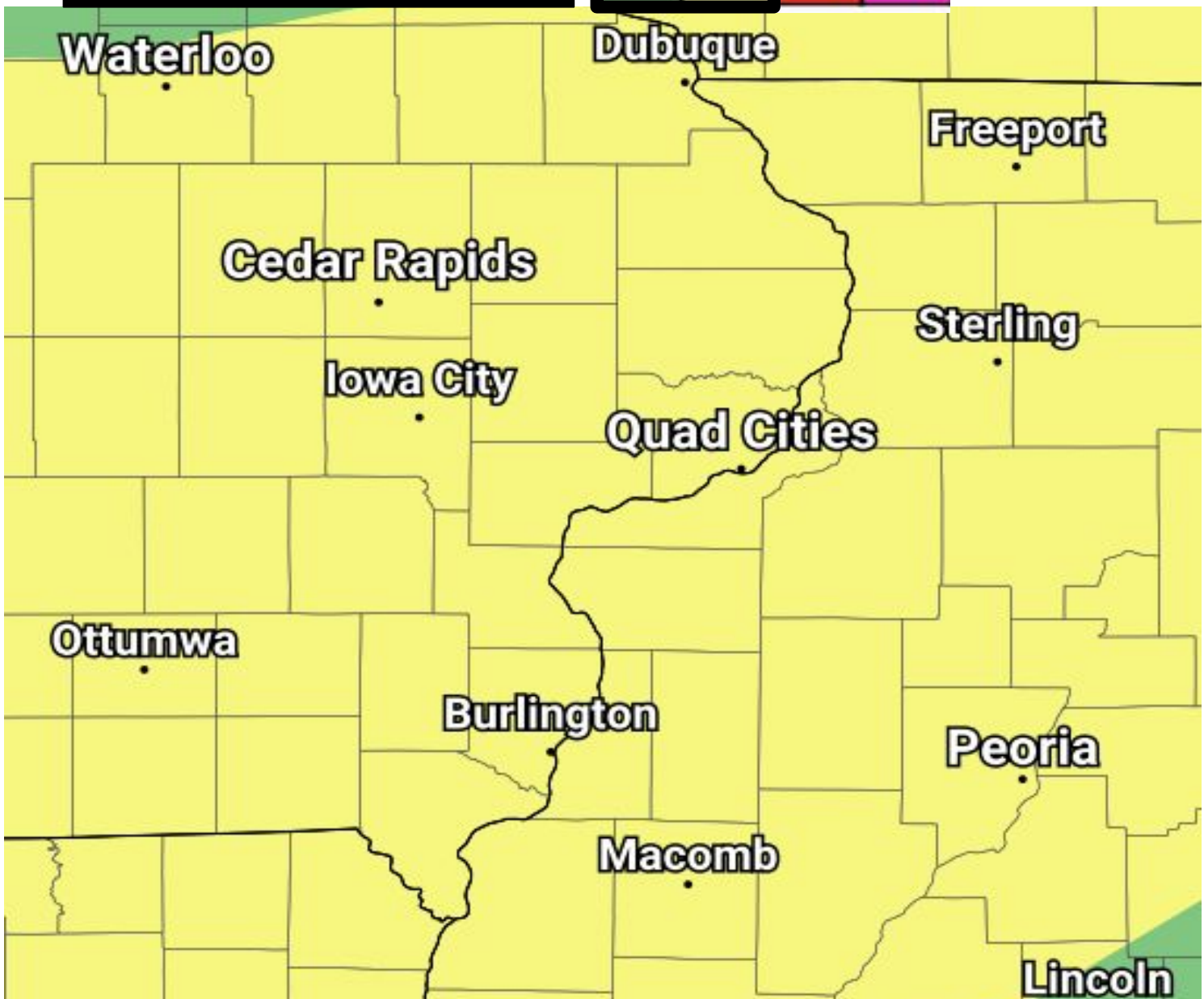


Flood Watch In Effect Through 1 AM Tonight

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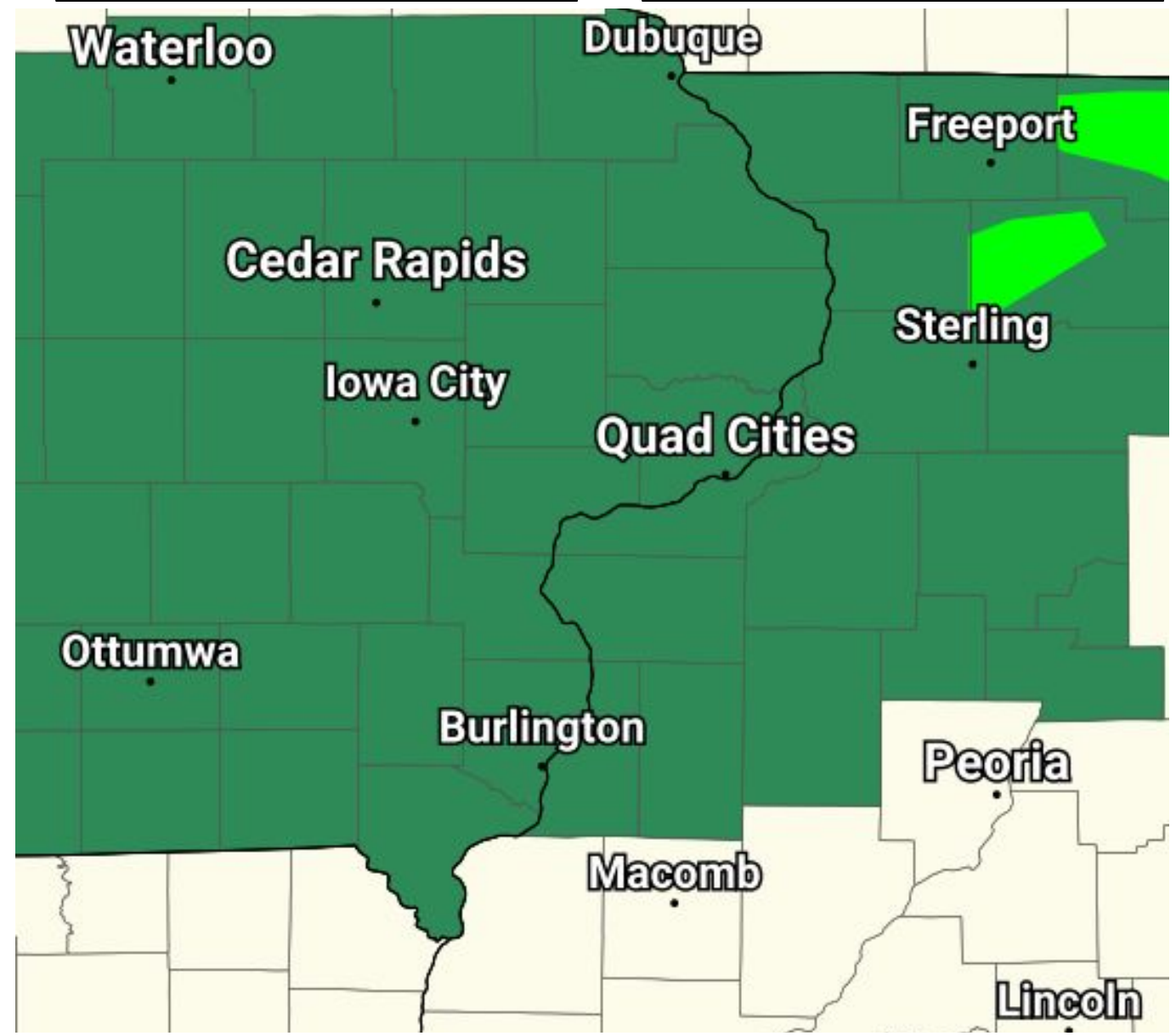
Rain Amounts of 1-3" to Bring an Increased Threat of Flash Flooding

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Stay Weather Aware!

3 SIMPLE STEPS FOR FLASH FLOOD SAFETY

During a flood, water levels and the rate at which the water is flowing can quickly change. Remain aware and monitor local radio and television.

- 1 GET TO HIGHER GROUND**
Get out of the areas subject to Flooding
- 2 DO NOT DRIVE INTO WATER**
Do NOT drive or walk into flooded areas. It only takes 6" of water to knock you off your feet.
- 3 STAY INFORMED**
Monitor local radar, television, weather radio, internet or social media for updates.

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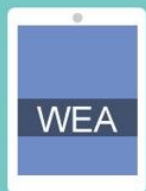

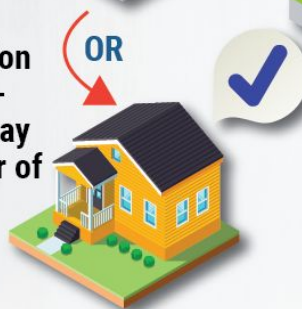
TORNADOES AND ROAD SAFETY

WHAT TO DO

Get off the road. The best option is to drive to a designated shelter, basement or safe room.

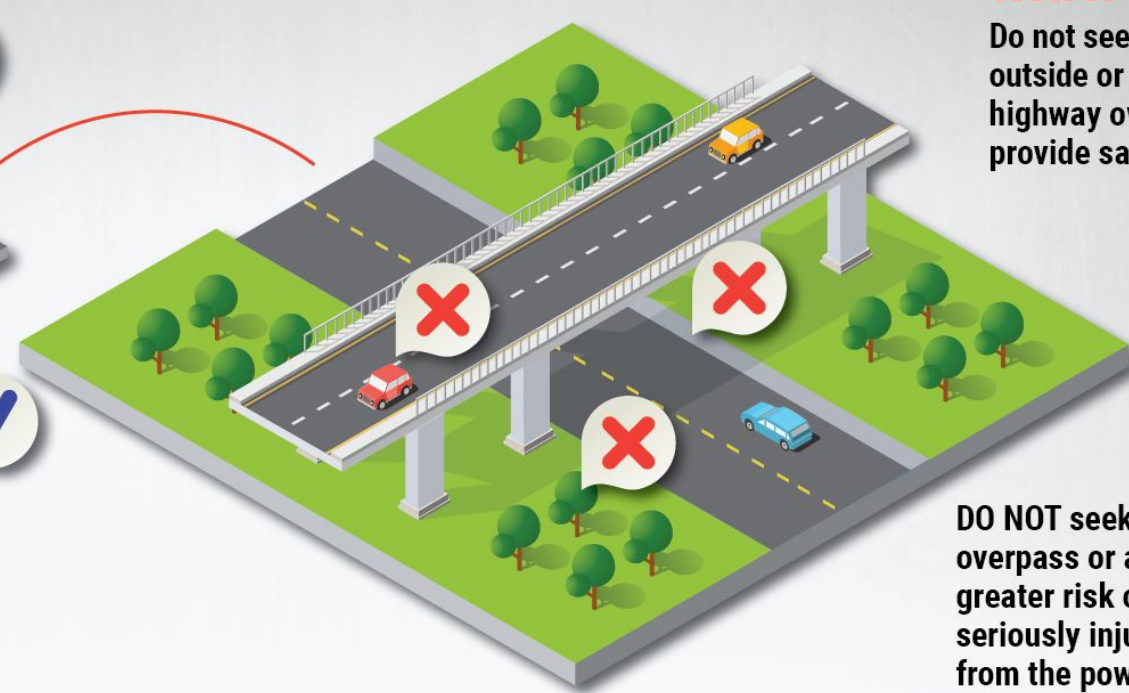


The next best option is a small, windowless room or hallway on the lowest floor of a sturdy building.



WHAT NOT TO DO

Do not seek refuge in a vehicle, outside or under an overpass. A highway overpass does not provide safety from a tornado.



DO NOT seek shelter under an overpass or a tree. This puts you at greater risk of being killed or seriously injured by flying debris from the powerful tornadic winds.
